Board of Deacons

Every year, Lent is a season that brings many strong feelings into the church; both the elation and joy of anticipating Easter and welcoming new members onto governing boards, to the dip and sorrow that comes with Maundy Thursday, and saying goodbye to those who have served us well.

A NOTE FROM THE DEACONS

It is vital for the Deacons to thank Debbie Kelchner, the outgoing chair of the Deacons, for her tireless efforts and dedication over the past 3 years, keeping all of us organized and guiding us to be a better board. From the beginning of when she took over duties, she proved herself to be the right choice.

During her time as Chair, Debbie has been an amazing leader through a very difficult time of transition. Her dedication and faithful guidance of the board has made a great difference in the life of our congregation, and we are indebted to her for stepping up and seeing us through a challenging season of change.

On that note, over the past few months or so, Ms. Kelchner and Rev. Rebecca have gone through the process of selecting a replacement. After deliberation, they have chosen Kate Schmitt for the job, a third year Deacon. The board wishes her the best of luck!

Every morning during Circle Time, families are greeted not only by a bustling Heather with announcements of all the Sunday School's going-ons, but also a large, felt liturgical calendar of the church in a circular shape, each moving of the arrow marking whether we're in lent, advent, pentecost, and so on. These periods of time have always been extremely important, as a connection to the time that biblical figures lived in -- each holiday having a different story and event. In a bright white is perhaps one of the most important of these, Easter, and before this Lent. The very last week of this is one of the most packed of the year -- called Holy Week for its overarching importance for being the last in which Christ was alive -- from Palm Sunday to Easter itself.

Palm Sunday always conjures memories of the Sunday School parading around the sanctuary for the UCCLC, waving their palms high in the air. This tradition, continuing as long as most can remember, honors Jesus's arrival to the city of Jerusalem with an enthusiastic reaction. Cries of 'Hosanna' were heard throughout, meaning "save now," along with the palm branches themselves symbolizing victory and purity. After the death of Christ, this is used once again by the people to express what he meant to them, waving them in air in a more somber manner than the children.

In many families, Maundy Thursday is the most important day before Easter, as the day of the Last Supper of the disciples. In honor of this, there is always a later service at the church, a somber reflection on the event, and the last day that Christ was alive. The communion done at this special service is always particularly heartfelt, as this was not only where the tradition originated from, but is also the only sacrament that is specifically commanded to do again -- "...do this in remembrance of me [..]" First Corinthians. The betrayal of Jesus is the main focus of the evening -- passages are read talking about how Jesus knew that this was coming, and how Judas signaled that he was the one with a kiss.

The majority of public schools and universities are closed on Good Friday, as another pensive day for most Christians -- the day

that Jesus was hung on the cross. Originally, after he was taken in, the Jewish leader Pontius Pilate found no reason to condemn him, ready to let him go. However, when the crowd heard this, they began to threaten riot, so he agreed to crucifixion as a preventive measure. The guards flogging him beforehand then mocked and ridiculed Christ, putting crowns of thorns upon his head. These events and more are recounted in the Station of the Cross, a ritual in which a group of people carry a cross on Good Friday from post to post, recounting what happened at each hour of the day.

The church then transitions from the sorrow and regret of Good Friday to a jubilous Easter morning. The story of this varies throughout the different disciple's viewpoint, but all talk of how believers went to the tomb (Peter in one story, Mary Magdalyn in another) to find the rock rolled to the side, and walking in to see the cloth used to cover Christ discarded on the floor. An angel (usually the angel Gabriel) came down upon them, telling what had happened. Christ had risen.

THE ORIGINS OF THE EASTER BUNNY

As a young girl, this author stepped up during the Children's Message to ask Rev. Richard DenUyl a question in a moment of daring confidence, right around the Easter season. The question in my mind was about the two different worlds that seem to be presented around this time: the celebration of

Easter at home -- with candy and eggs; and the celebration at church -- about Jesus's rebirth. These were not completely separate in my mind, but there was a sharp divide when it came to the Holy Spirit and an anthropomorphized rabbit. So, I asked about how they first came to be related.

The next week, Pastor Rich came back reporting on the reason. When all of the children were called up, he explained to them a myth about how Jesus went around on his travel, saying that a young rabbit followed him around wherever he went. After the death, this 'follower' started spreading the goodwill all around - specifically in the Easter baskets of children.

After investigating it further, no trace of this story could be found. The Easter Bunny seems to be like Santa Claus -- a Western invention to brighten the lives of children.

Board of Trustees

Tom Schmitt, Interim Chair

At the Trustees' February meeting, Pastor Rebecca and I announced our nomination of Jane Lorch to be chair of the Board of Trustees for the coming year. Following procedural motions, Trustees unanimously and enthusiastically voted Jane Lorch to chair the Board of Trustees effective as of the February 21st Annual Meeting. The Board of Trustees also discussed, addressed and/or took action on the following:

- Tom Schmitt provisions of 2016 staff employment contracts & position descriptions and the processes associated with creating them. Pastor Rebecca delivered those documents to each staff member.
- Debbie Kelchner discussed proposed modification to pamphlets that summarize procedures, practices and policies covering use of the church for funerals and weddings. In particular the Trustees focused on tiered pricing associated with church use for those events.
- Tom Schmitt reviewed slight modifications to Pastor Rebecca's call agreement: adding a more complete description of pastoral absences that prompt use of "supply ministers," modifying the timing of housing allowance payments and changing the agreement term from the period September 15, 2016 – September 14, 2016 to the period January 1, 2016 – December 31, 2016.
- Tom also reviewed the Nominating Committee report to the Congregation and summarized Transitions among the various church officers, boards and committees as well as the leadership for each.
- Bob Hartnett reviewed the year-end financial report for 2015 and presented a draft budget for 2016. After lengthy discussion, the Trustees voted unanimously to support the budget which will be presented at the Annual Meeting. Please

refer to the Finance Committee report for more complete details.

- Peter Derbyshire, chair of the Building and Grounds Committee (subcommittee of the Board of Trustees) reviewed ongoing and upcoming church maintenance and repair needs.
- Working with a church attorney, the Trustees prepared an easement for installation of a neighbor's underground utilities on church property. Our neighbor now has that document for review prior to its being its being recorded with the church's property deed. Tom Schmitt, Interim Chair.
- Little Peeps Nursery School has requested a lease extension, on which the Trustees have initiated a review.
- Through special counsel, Trustees have resolved a question having to do with AT&T use of its leased steeple space and will soon begin discussions regarding renewal of that arrangement. Simultaneously we have invited both AT&T and other carriers to consider leasing additional and/or alternative space for installation of cellular communications equipment in the church steeple.

Finance would like to thank everyone for their continued support and the Congregation for approving the 2016 budget. We can now focus all our attention on ways to increase income while keeping expenses in check. The Committee is very dedicated and with the addition of two new members we will have even more resources to help with this endeavor. Regular discussions with our financial advisors as well as constant communications with Personnel, Stewardship and Buildings and Grounds will be the norm. While we are fortunate to have Rev. Rebecca on board, we do realize that the transition is going to take a little longer than we would like. With a little guidance we are confident that this year will show us that we have indeed turned the page and are well on our way on this wonderful journey.

A wonderful book I would like to share with you is *Braiding Sweetgrass: Indigenous Wisdom, Scientific Knowledge, and the Teachings of Plants* by Robin Wall Kimmerer. Here is a review from Goodreads: *With incredible*

grace and inspiring attention to the natural world, Robin Wall Kimmerer takes readers on a field trip through ancient forests and backyard ponds, sacred sites and urban wastelands. Plants become powerful metaphors for healing our relationship with the natural world, and guides in the process of becoming indigenous to place ourselves. Through a unique combination of science, Native American teachings, and memoir, she shows us in the most subtle of ways how plants are our indigenous teachers, ultimately revealing a path toward healing the rift that grows between people and nature. As a leading researcher in the field of biology, Robin Wall Kimmerer understands the delicate state of our world. But as an active member of the Potawatomi nation, she senses and relates to the world through a way of knowing far older than any science.

Holly Billings recommended this book to me, and I started reading it and then bought myself a copy. Since then I have shared copies with others, as I want to share a beautiful book. One of my favorite chapters is Witch Hazel. It is a book that is read slowly so you can savor it. Each chapter begins with a line or two. Here is the chapter on Epiphany In The Beans: *"It came to me while picking beans, the secret of happiness."*

When you read a good book, you want to share it and that is what I am doing here. One of our beloved members, Janet Goodman did that with me for years and this is a book I know

she would have loved. So now, as she did with me, I share with you, my friends.

Below is a list of documents and when to shred:

Bank deposit slips — Once you have reconciled your statement.

Banking Statements — At year end store them with tax returns if needed to prove deductions

Brokerage. (401(k), IRA, Keogh — Shred monthly, quarterly as new ones arrive. Other investment statements, hang onto annual statements until you sell the investments.

Credit Card bills — After you have checked and paid them.

Insurance Policies — After you renew them.

Pay stubs — After you reconcile them with your W-2

Receipts — After you reconcile them with your credit card or bank statements.

Tax Returns and supporting documents — After 7 years.

Savings Bonds — Cash them in when they mature.

Social Security Statements — After you get a new statement, then shred the old one.

Household warranties/receipts — After you no longer own the household items.

Investment purchase confirmations and 1099's — Keep until you sell the securities, then keep them with your tax returns for 7 years.

Safe-deposit Box inventory — **NEVER**, but update annually.

Employer benefit plan — **NEVER**

KEEP IN SAFE-DEPOSIT BOX

Birth and Death Certificates — **NEVER**
Estate Planning Documents — **NEVER**
Life Insurance Policies — **NEVER** or when policy has ended.

Loan Documents — After you sell whatever the loan was for.

Marriage license or divorce decrees — **NEVER**

Social Security Card — **NEVER**

Vehicle Titles — After you sell the vehicle.

Military discharge papers — **NEVER**

David and Goliath will be the topic of our workshops in April.



Gaps

"Jonah cried out, 'In forty days Nineveh shall be overthrown!' The Ninevites believed God. Everyone, great and small, put on sackcloth." - Jonah 3:4-5

Jonah preaches: "Change your ways now, or else God will lower the boom!" Instantly the nasty Ninevites repent.

I've tried to change fast like a Ninevite, but it doesn't work. Oh, I've broken bad habits, forgiven hurts, acted honestly when it was easier not to. But with a crushing inevitability, I've also relapsed. A lot.

God demands change, but it can seem like a set-up. Doesn't God know I'm a walking gap between resolution and deed? That I can't resolve my ambivalence once and for all? Is God toying with me? That's not a God you love. It's a God you fear. Who needs that? So here's what I've come to believe about gaps (it's self-serving, but the Bible backs me up): Gaps don't condemn us, they save us. God comes closest to us in our gaps. No gaps, no mercy.

Spiritually moribund people are blissfully unaware of having any gaps. Spiritually self-assured people are certain they have none. You won't find them up at night wondering if there's more to discipleship than what they already do so well for Jesus. But people who are painfully aware of their gaps give God an opening.

That lag-time between command and compliance? It becomes a grace period. The gap between deciding and doing? It's filled to the brim with mercy.

Conversion isn't about closing gaps. It's about letting our gaps be holy venues where endless lack meets endless love. The command is not so much to permanently convert as to be permanently convertible, which means to confess every day that we need.

Mercy will change us more than effort ever will.

Prayer

Let my gaps be a magnet for mercy; my failure, the scene of new love.
